

## **Massimo Leone**

Massimo Leone is Full Professor of Philosophy of Communication, Cultural and Visual Semiotics at the University of Turin, Director of the Center for Religious Studies at FBK (Trento), and Professor of Semiotics at Shanghai University. He is also Associate Member of Cambridge Digital Humanities, Adjunct Professor at UCAB (Caracas) and Korea University (Seoul), and a member of Academia Europaea. He is the author of seventeen books and more than seven hundred scholarly articles. He received an ERC Consolidator Grant in 2018 and an ERC Proof of Concept Grant in 2022. He is Editor-in-Chief of *Lexia* and *Semiotica* and directs four international book series.

## **Federico Laudisa**

Federico Laudisa is Full Professor of Logic and Philosophy of Science at the Department of Humanities of the University of Trento. His research focuses on the philosophy and foundations of physics, particularly quantum mechanics and the history of modern scientific thought. Among his recent publications are the monograph *Dalla fisica alla filosofia naturale. Niels Bohr e la cultura scientifica del Novecento* (Bollati Boringhieri, 2023), as well as several articles on the history and interpretation of quantum mechanics published in *Studies in History and Philosophy of Science* and *The European Physical Journal H*. He is also the author of the entry “*Scientific Naturalism*” in *The Palgrave Encyclopedia of Theoretical and Philosophical Psychology* (Springer, 2026).

## **Richard Hall-Wilton**

Richard Hall-Wilton is Director of the Sensors & Devices Centre at the Bruno Kessler Foundation (FBK) in Trento, Italy. Before joining FBK, he worked at several major international research institutions, including the European Spallation Source ERIC in Lund, CERN in Geneva, University College London, and York University in Toronto. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Bristol and an undergraduate degree from the University of Cambridge. With a multidisciplinary background, his work combines scientific research with a strong interest in the humanistic and social implications of technology, fostering interdisciplinary collaboration between the humanities and scientific research centers within FBK.

## **Elena Ioriatti**

Elena Ioriatti, is Full Professor of Comparative Private Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Trento, where she teaches Comparative Legal Systems in English. Since 2022, she has served as an elected member of the Academic Senate of the University of Trento and is Editor-in-Chief of the journal *Comparative Law and Language*, published by the University of Trento. Her research interests include Comparative Law methodology, European Private Law, legal translation, and EU legal language. She is the author, co-author, and editor of eleven books in the field of Comparative Law, including the 2024 handbook *Comparative Legal Systems. An Introduction* (co-authored with Alessandra De Luca), adopted by several universities in Italy and abroad.

## **Stefano Borgo**

Stefano Borgo is Senior Researcher at the Institute of Cognitive Sciences and Technologies of the Italian National Research Council (ISTC-CNR) in Trento, where he has long been active within the Laboratory for Applied Ontology (LOA). His research focuses on applied ontology, knowledge representation, and information modeling, with applications in artificial intelligence, robotics, engineering design, and socio-technical systems. He has contributed to the development of

foundational ontologies such as DOLCE and has coordinated and participated in numerous international interdisciplinary research projects. He currently serves on the editorial boards of *Applied Ontology* and the *Semantic Web Journal*.

## **Andrea Pradi**

Andrea Pradi is Professor (ag.) of Comparative Legal Systems and Introduction to Anglo-American Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Trento. He holds an LL.M. from UC Berkeley School of Law and a Ph.D. in Comparative Law from the University of Trento. His research focuses on Comparative Law and the Economic Analysis of Property, Intellectual Property, and the Commons. He is the author of several scholarly publications, including “*Private Property and the Commons: The Case Study of Water Distribution in Persian Qanats (Part I)*” published in *Global Jurist* (2023).

## **Luca Pes**

Luca Pes is Associate Professor of Comparative Law at the University of Trento. Trained in both law and anthropology, he holds a Ph.D. in Private and Comparative Law from the University of Turin and a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the London School of Economics. His research focuses on comparative law, legal anthropology, African legal systems, migration law, and the relationship between law and social change. He has taught and conducted research at several international institutions, including Leiden University and the International University College of Turin, and is the author of numerous publications on law, development, and legal pluralism.

## **Gianmatteo Sabatino**

Gianmatteo Sabatino is Researcher in Comparative Law at the University of Trento. He was previously Research Fellow in Comparative and European Law at the Sino-Italian Institute of the Zhongnan University of Economics and Law. He holds a Ph.D. in Comparative and European Legal Studies and his research focuses on comparative economic law, Chinese and Asian legal systems, development planning law, sustainability, and legal anthropology. He is the author of several publications on Chinese law, comparative law, and international economic regulation. Among his major works is the monograph *I paradigmi giuridici della pianificazione per lo sviluppo* (Editoriale Scientifica, 2022), devoted to comparative models of legal planning and economic governance. More recently, his research has addressed issues related to ecological transition, green finance, and circular economy in Chinese and comparative law.

## **Ugo Mattei**

Ugo Mattei is Full Professor of Civil Law at the University of Turin and Distinguished Professor at the University of California, San Francisco College of the Law. One of the leading scholars in comparative law and the theory of the commons, his research focuses on private law, property, ecological transition, and the relationship between law, economy, and social justice. He is the author and editor of numerous books and more than one hundred scholarly publications translated into several languages. More recently, he has also explored the legal implications of technology and artificial intelligence, including in his book *La fine del diritto* and in the article “*The Legal Metaverse and Comparative Taxonomy: A Reappraisal*” published in *The American Journal of Comparative Law* (2023).

## **Sara Hejazi**

Sara Hejazi is a Researcher at the Sensors & Devices Center and the Center for Religious Studies of the Bruno Kessler Foundation (FBK). She holds a Ph.D. in Cultural Anthropology and Epistemology of Complexity from the University of Bergamo and has more than fifteen years of fieldwork research experience. Her work focuses on the social impact of new technologies, human–machine interaction, and the social transformations generated by technological innovation. She has also conducted extensive research on gender and religion, identity construction, monastic practices, and cultural diversity in urban contexts.

## **Ugo Malvagna**

Ugo Malvagna is Associate Professor of Financial Markets Law at the University of Trento, where he teaches Economic Law, Law and Finance, and Sustainable Finance Regulation. He holds a Ph.D. in Business Law from Bocconi University in Milan and has been a visiting researcher at the Max Planck Institute for Comparative and International Private Law in Hamburg. He is an Associated Researcher at the European Banking Institute in Frankfurt and a Fellow of the European Law Institute in Vienna. He serves as Editorial Coordinator of the *Rivista di Diritto Bancario* and is a member of the editorial committee of *Banca, borsa, titoli di credito*. His research focuses on financial regulation, with particular attention to innovation and digital finance.

## **Giorgia Bincoletto**

Giorgia Bincoletto is Research Fellow in Comparative Private Law at the University of Trento and member of the LawTech Research Group. She teaches Law of the Digital Era and Informatics and Legal Research, and collaborates with the chairs of Civil Law and Comparative Legal Systems. Her research focuses on comparative privacy and data protection law, digital health, e-health regulation, open science, and the legal implications of emerging technologies. She is the author of the monograph *Data Protection by Design in the E-Health Care Sector: Theoretical and Applied Perspectives* (Nomos, 2021) and co-author of *Diritto comparato della privacy e della protezione dei dati personali* (Ledizioni, 2023).

## **Emanuele Ariano**

Emanuele Ariano is Adjunct Professor of Civil Law at the University of Turin and Deputy Academic Coordinator and Faculty Member of the International University College of Turin, where he teaches Foundations of Comparative Law. His research focuses on private law, comparative law, property, law and economics, and comparative civil justice. He is Associate Editor of *Global Jurist* and author of several publications in comparative law, including *Il modello di common law* (with Ugo Mattei, 5th ed., 2018; new edition forthcoming in 2025). More recently, his research has explored the relationship between property, law, and artificial intelligence in the age of surveillance capitalism

## **Federica Mantegazzini**

Federica Mantegazzini is an experimental physicist and Head of the Superconducting Quantum Devices Research Unit at the Sensors & Devices Centre of the Bruno Kessler Foundation (FBK) in Trento. Her research focuses on superconducting quantum devices, quantum sensing, cryogenic detectors, and quantum computing technologies. She has contributed to several interdisciplinary

projects on superconducting circuits and qubits, including the development of the first superconducting qubit entirely produced in Italy.

### **Andrea Rossato**

Andrea Rossato is Professor (ag.) at the Department of Psychology and Cognitive Science of the University of Trento. His research focuses on comparative law, digital commons, intellectual property, free software, and the relationship between law and technological architectures. He is the author of *Diritto e architettura nello spazio digitale. Il ruolo del software libero* (Cedam, 2006) and of several publications on digital commons, open data, and the legal implications of digital technologies. More recently, his work has explored the relationship between technological infrastructures, regulation, and forms of private ordering in the digital environment.

### **Pier Giuseppe Monateri**

Pier Giuseppe Monateri is Full Professor of Comparative Law at the University of Turin and one of Italy's leading comparative legal scholars. His research spans comparative private law, legal theory, law and economics, and the cultural dimensions of legal systems, with particular attention to globalization and the theory of the commons. He is the author and editor of numerous books and more than one hundred scholarly publications translated into several languages. Among his recent works are *Comparative Legal Methods* (Edward Elgar, 2021) and *Quantitative Methods in Comparative Law* (Edward Elgar, 2023). More recently, his research has explored the impact of quantitative methods, digitalization, and algorithmic justice on comparative law and legal theory.
